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Old Business:

13 Lanfear Road property:

Attorney Fuller reported he has the Bond Documents here tonight so they can be signed after the meeting and would imagine it would be Thursday or Friday the money will be in the Towns account. Tomorrow they will schedule a closing on the property for Tuesday or Wednesday of next week. Supervisor Thomas asked if the interest rate is 2.1%. Attorney Fuller stated yes, it did stay the same.

Supervisor Thomas asked if this was just for the truck. Supt. Bradley stated yes the body can be done anytime and will be bided out. Attorney Fuller stated the body wasn't on the Oneida bid? Supt. Bradley stated yes it was but we are going to have to go out to bid with it. Attorney Fuller stated the body bids didn't have the same issue as the truck. So if that one is still good we can probably piggybank that one. Attorney Fuller and Supt. Bradley will follow up on that.

Attorney Fuller stated finance wise do you know what you want to do? Supervisor Thomas stated they probably don't know exactly, no. At the last meeting there was \$131,000.00 in the Fund Balance approximately and there is \$35,000.00 budgeted for equipment. He doesn't believe he would go below \$60,000.00 as far as the Fund Balance. So if you went down to \$60,000.00 that would give you \$62,000.00 and the \$35,000.00 budgeted it would give you \$97,000.00. Supt. Bradley stated they wouldn't take delivery of the truck until January 2018.

Supervisor Thomas stated there is \$132,423.00 in Fund Balance they will be taking out \$8,813.00 later in the meeting that will leave \$122,609.00. Even if we left it at \$62,609.00 that would give you \$60,000.00 and the \$35,000.00 it would give you \$95,000.00.

Councilman John Thomas stated what Supt. Bradley is saying is in January there would be another \$35,000.00 budgeted for the equipment. Supervisor Thomas stated yes.

Councilman John Thomas stated that would bring it up to roughly \$130,000.00 as long as it comes in after January.

Supervisor Thomas stated if we borrow the money after the first of the year we don't have to make a payment next year. Attorney Fuller stated exactly. Supervisor Thomas stated it would have to be after the first of the year if you're going to apply the other \$35,000.00. Councilman John Thomas stated with the body you would be looking at another \$76,000.00 we would basically have to borrow. Supervisor Thomas agreed. We are looking to borrow \$74,000.00-\$75,000.00. Attorney Fuller stated he can make it for any amount, you don't have to borrow that total. So if we said \$75,000.00. Supervisor Thomas stated yes that should cover it. Supt. Bradley will look over the bids then you can award it and have the Bond Resolution. You have the Bond Resolution but you don't issue the note until next year. You're putting the finances in place to buy the truck.

Supervisor Thomas asked if they needed to award the bid tonight. Attorney Fuller stated you could, if you don't borrow the money you would have to pay for it out of fund next year. The risk is you pass the Bond Resolution next month and somebody, you have the 20 day stopple if someone challenges you have to come up with the money some other way. You can award it subject to Supt. Bradley's review and approval of the bid.

Councilman Carl Thomas stated New York Truck's bid was \$127,000.00 with options and assumes the H.L. Gage bid included all the options so the New York Truck is \$9,000.00 less to start. Attorney Fuller stated the only other thing they have to be concerned about is somebody launching a challenge of the town borrowing the money. In that case you would know and you have to budget it next year in the Highway Budget. Councilman John Thomas asked if there was any advantage to passing the resolution tonight or do you want the 30 days to look over the bids and make sure everything is what it should be. Attorney Fuller stated probably just build time. Supt. Bradley stated that's the big thing build time. Supt. Bradley stated he doesn't believe another month is going to hurt, it's going to take a while to build it. Attorney Fuller will have the resolution to award it and he thinks Supt. Bradley will be ok on the bed and will be able to deal with the box and will have the Bond Resolution ready. Supervisor Thomas asked if this would have to go to the Comptroller again. Attorney Fuller will have to look, it may be ok with the highway truck.

#### EMS:

Supervisor Thomas reported that the county is discussing the EMS service in the county. The Town Board received a copy of the proposal /report and recommendations which was prepared by three EMS Coordinators. They had a meeting and Supervisor Thomas thought they went back to the way they were a year ago. He doesn't believe Glens Falls or Queensbury will be involved in whatever they do. Luzerne doesn't want to be involved. Councilman John Thomas stated that Johnsbury is self-sufficient so they are doing all right with it.

Supervisor Thomas stated where it's going to end up he doesn't know but he thought the Board should have a copy of what they put together. The proposal basically was to establish two flight cars and hire ALS Paramedics to staff them. The total price to establish this is \$904,000.00 which includes \$171,000.00 a one-time charge for the cars. That's hiring eight ALS people, a Coordinator and someone to man it. It was to help out and fill the voids where there was a problem. At the meeting someone from Empire Ambulance was there and they asked Empire to give them a price of what they would charge, he thinks it was for two ambulances and staff. Councilman John Thomas stated that's the way they use to fill the gaps and be covered was with Empire. Councilman Nathan Thomas stated when Empire lost the City of Glens Falls they could no longer support ambulance service in the North Country.

Supervisor Thomas stated the bottom line is Stony Creek is going to have to start raising some money to pay for this because we are going to end up paying either the county, Luzerne or Warrensburg.

Supervisor Thomas stated that one thing that came out of the meeting is the committee authorized \$20,000.00 for a non-responding program and believes they are going to offer it to all the agencies within the county. Someone said there is four or five that are using it. He isn't sure what it is but the description was that it's a monitor so everyone would be able to tell pretty much of what's going on. Councilman Nathan Thomas stated yes you can log in on your phone and you can tell where there's a crew. Supervisor Thomas stated this would probably be approved Friday at the county meeting. Councilman John Thomas stated the big part of the problem this year has been the radio system, the county radio system. Stony Creek pagers don't go off. They had a repeater put in last week they got it and he has to figure how to program the frequency's in the new pagers. This will pick up on it and not everything else. He has a company where they purchased the pagers and has an email sent to him.

Supervisor Thomas stated as we approach the budget he is thinking we are going to need \$30-\$40,000.00. He probably won't do that all at once, probably half of it, then half of it again the next year because he thinks it's coming one way or another. We have to be ready for it anyways.

#### Committee Reports:

##### Knowlhurst Cemetery:

Supervisor Thomas talked with Anthony Lomenzo about the Knowlhurst Cemetery and after they take possession of the property the town will figure out what they want to do to get it completed.

##### Glassbrook Cemetery:

Supervisor Thomas reported the upper part, Section III is being plotted out. They have 72 markers down.

##### Warren County Adopt-A-Highway:

Supervisor Thomas reported that Warren County has an Adopt-A-Highway Program. This is to pick up garbage along the highway. If anyone knows of an organization or someone that would want to sponsor it they get a sign with their name on the highway.

Waylon Baker and his wife did pick up Harrisburg Road about a month ago. Councilman Carl Thomas asked if the Town had a "No Littering Law" on the books. Supervisor Thomas stated he would have to check he isn't sure. He knows the State does. Councilman Carl Thomas stated that just about daily he gets someone's breakfast wrap in his driveway. He thinks we should have something for littering on the books with a little penalty to it. Supervisor Thomas stated that he would check to see if the town has something on the books. Councilman Carl Thomas stated that maybe in the summertime we get someone from Green Thumb and have them do a section at a time. Councilman Nathan Thomas stated if you don't want to pay you're fine get an orange bag and go along the highway. Supt. Bradley stated that would be a good idea to have Judge Law switch from fines to picking up garbage. Supervisor Thomas and Councilman Nathan Thomas agreed. Councilman Carl Thomas stated something like that would certainly improve it. Supervisor Thomas stated you have to have law enforcement to catch anyone.

#### Dog Control:

Supervisor Thomas asked the Dog Control Officer, Maxine Zawartkay if she would do a dog enumeration and she indicated she will. Mrs. Zawartkay indicated she would put up a flyer and send it out. This hasn't been done in four or five years.

#### New Business:

##### Hazard Mitigation Plan:

Supervisor Thomas stated about a year and a half ago the county got a \$150,000.00 grant to help pay for the update of the county and the town's plan. The grant is 75/25%. The county hired a company, Petrotech to help develop and put the plan together. The plan is pending FEMA approval and each town will have to adopt theirs. It doesn't have to be adopted tonight, he wanted the Board to have a copy for review. The items within the plan, if there is another declared emergency in this area these items will become eligible for funding and that's the purpose of it. Supervisor Thomas asked the board to take a month to look it over and if any mistakes are found let him know and hopefully they can adopt it and go from there.

#### Warren County Intermunicipal Agreement:

Supervisor Thomas reported that Warren County drafted an Intermunicipal Agreement for a license to locate a tower behind the town hall. The attorney reviewed it and Attorney Fuller did make changes to it. It doesn't have to be approved tonight. Supervisor Thomas stated that Attorney Fuller crossed out the liability part for the town insuring the county. Attorney Fuller stated yes and the indemnification too. He doesn't know why we would be indemnifying them for putting their tower on the town's property. Supervisor Thomas agreed. And stated that once the County Attorney has the chance to go over this again we will probably have another copy. The county is looking into hiring a contractor. They have four sites they have to put up towers and they are looking to get a contractor to organize and coordinate it. The one in Luzerne and Warrensburg the Undersheriff and DPW did all the permits and all the work. They feel they don't have that much time to do the APA permits and everything else they have to do. By the time they get it done it could be a couple years before you see a tower.

#### Wi-Fi proposal:

Supervisor Thomas reported it's an unsolicited proposal. John O'Neill was with him and bought it in about a month ago. It's basically to create a wireless mesh network. He thinks through the hamlet area or as far as they can go with it. That's about all he knows about it. Supervisor Thomas got to the end of it and there is five phases. The first phase is research and study and their proposal fee is \$20,000.00. The second phase is engineering and design installation configuration operations maintenance and support. His opinion would be the Board read it over and see what it is, see if it's a worthy idea, see if it's something we want to consider doing. If it is he would suggest they get a consultant or someone that knows more about it and see if it's feasible and worthwhile doing. If that's the case then we would develop some specs and put out a RFP (Request for Proposals). Councilman John Thomas asked about the lines they put up on Warrensburg Road. This was fiber optic lines that go right to Stony Creek Ranch. They are paying for it. Councilwoman Ryan stated she heard that if anyone wanted it there would be a separate charge, individual.

Councilman Carl Thomas asked if came about maybe because of the discussion of having the Wi-Fi at the park. Supervisor Thomas stated he thinks that played into it. This piggybanks off of the towns Wi-Fi. We would help supple it along with the library and fire department and whoever has Wi-Fi that would want to feed into the system. Supervisor Thomas stated he talked to Ed Bartholomew and he knows a gentleman that works for Frontier and that he is acquainted with, a Mr. Vanguard, he is with Public Relation. He told Mr. Bartholomew on May 8<sup>th</sup> that they have eight other projects in the region and that they are developing work plans for each one and a timeline for the State Broadband Office and he thought that by mid-June there would be more information as to what the \$803,000.00 for Stony Creek would actually be. See what they are actually going to do. This might be a possibility to do but would have to go through bidding or RFP process.

#### Southern Adirondack Magazine Ad:

071-17. A resolution was made by Supervisor Thomas seconded by Councilwoman Ryan To purchase a full page ad in the Southern Adirondack Magazine in the amount of \$945.00, with 50% (\$472.50) being reimbursed by the First Wilderness Heritage Corridor. Roll call vote, all in favor.

#### Recreation Field; Beach area:

Supervisor Thomas reported down by the beach, he always thought that if they put up a couple walls on each side they could enclose it and stop the beach from getting larger. He thought about it for a few years. He did speak to Supt. Bradley to see if the highway department would be interested in it. A few years ago Soil and Water did a little bit of surveying it and they came up with 45 feet on one side and 55 feet on the other. Supervisor Thomas figured if we had walls that were three or four feet tall we could put crushed stone behind them so they would drain and put topsoil on the top and contain the beach a little and make it look a little better. He was thinking about using the similar block they used on the corner of Swears Road. They are two foot by one foot. He calculated 204 blocks.

When they did the corner of Swears Road in 2013 they were \$30.00 apiece. He figured \$35.00 and it comes out to \$7140.00. He hasn't gotten an actual price. He has to get three quotes. He figured \$1000.00 for the base, pipe, stone and topsoil. He is thinking it would cost \$8000.00 to accomplish that. He was wondering if that was something the Board would be interested in. Councilman Carl Thomas asked if at the same time it ought to be considered, we are talking about a walk over bridge from shore to shore and incorporate that somehow into the wall. Supervisor Thomas stated that would be in a different location. Councilman John Thomas asked about a base. Supt. Bradley stated you would probably want a concrete base. Councilwoman Ryan asked how high the water has ever been. Councilman Nathan Thomas stated two feet of water on the basketball court, but that was the 2011 storm. Councilman John Thomas stated normally it doesn't go that high. Supt. Bradley stated the water comes down by the basketball hoop down through so maybe put a catch basin there. Supervisor Thomas stated the whole field drains to the beach. Supt. Bradley stated if you build it up it will go somewhere else. So you'll have to put something in to hold it, but that is simple. Councilman John Thomas stated he has seen the big concrete barrier things. Supt. Bradley stated they are jersey barriers. Councilman John Thomas stated they weren't as thick, wide. They are two foot height wise, someone told him they weren't quite two foot wide but they had like the stone face on them. Supt. Bradley stated they do, they make them decorative too. You can look into a poured wall with a stamped concrete. Councilman John Thomas stated he was thinking about what could be put in there for a basin, is it going to wash up and have to go back and put the thing back up. They are a hefty block, they seem to hold up good on the wall but they don't have the water. Supervisor Thomas stated in Lake George on West Brook they have bigger blocks. They look like there about three foot long. He almost thinks they would stay there. Supt. Bradley stated if you had a good base under it. If it tips over you have the base to put back. The hardest thing is the base, once that goes up it's a piece of cake. Councilman John Thomas asked if we had to get permits to do the digging to get the base in or will Soil and Water help us out with that. Supervisor Thomas stated we aren't in the creek. Councilman John Thomas stated he thinks we need to do something it's a constant problem.

072-17. A resolution was made by Supervisor Thomas seconded by Councilman Carl Thomas to purchase material and construct two sections of wall along the creek by the beach area not to exceed \$8000.00. Roll call vote, all in favor.

073-17. A resolution was made by Councilman Nathan Thomas seconded by Councilman John Thomas authorizing the following budget transfer:

075-17. A resolution was made by Councilman Carl Thomas seconded by Councilwoman Ryan authorizing the following budget transfer:

Credit DA9060.8 Medical Insurance \$8,813.74. Roll call vote, all in favor.

Supervisor Thomas reported the Memorial Day Parade will be held on May 29<sup>th</sup>, 2017 at 3:00 PM with refreshments at the town hall following the parade.

From the floor:

Carol LaGrasse commented on the following:

On the Intermunicipal Agreement you took out the town indemnifying the county but you didn't mention whether the county indemnifies the town, Supervisor Thomas stated yes they do.

Fiber optic proposal: the LaGrasse's house is on Lanfear Road. On Lanfear Road it's on the North South side route, which you spoke about and it has had fiber optic cable for quite a while now so they naturally have high speed web access. The telephone company doesn't charge them very much for that. Their computer is Wi-Fi and they have another computer around the house, she can't tell you if its 20 feet or 100 feet, and that computer furnishes the Wi-Fi access. There is a lot of places in town that should be accessible to the fiber optic line because when they connected that for them they said they go quite a distance just with the old copper wire and that's down on Lanfear Road and they are about a half mile in. so there has to be quite a lot of concentration of population that already have Wi-Fi. She thinks the town should be aware of the Thurman thing being replicated, spend a lot of money for people out in the boonies. She didn't ask anybody to give her Wi-Fi she got it by luck. They don't have telephone service it doesn't come up Lanfear Road but she doesn't expect the town to give her telephone services. That's the most basic thing then Wi-Fi access. They don't have cell service because of the APA so they are pretty much in the darkness as voice access. As a member of the public she registered a preliminary statement of hesitation about the town investing in that kind of private service for the population.

Peter LaGrasse:

He apologized for not being here before when it was being discussed but he wanted to say, at that it became clear that no action would be taken by the Supervisors or this committee until they saw other options that would possibly be available. It opened it to getting a bid from Empire and from the City of Glens Falls to see what possible things they could do to omit, less the EMS ALS portion without going to the county spending a million dollars on two fly cars 24/7 360.

That's two crews for the entire year. The only action taken by the committee was one of the recommendations was to buy the software for a communication system so that every squad would be able to report in daily if that had a crew ready to go. Later after the meeting was over he spoke to Travis Howe and Mickey Guy and they bought this up because right now Stony Creek is not being called if there is any basic life support calls in Thurman they aren't being called. They are rarely being called in Lake Luzerne. This would solve this problem and they would be called in. It would jump other procedures that the county dispatchers use to not call Stony Creek, It would be calling Stony Creek and its exactly the system that Mickey Guy wants to develop where the resources are deployed where they are needed on a more flexible bases then is happening now. The other thing is there is discussion of this by the Bolton Landing Supervisor as well because he has a similar problem like Stony Creek. Hague doesn't have ALS and Bolton Landing supplies the ALS to Hague and in the summer they have to hire two crews and that becomes a little bit of a problem even among the wealthy tax base towns. He saw and other captains saw absolutely no reason to join any county system because they and Johnsbury Captain made a big point of this in studying it. You lose if you have ALS and you give it to the county. You are going to lose more money than you make up. He calculated the difference between his operation in Johnsbury one way and the other way and he was out \$40,000.00 if he gave up the ALS and let the county do it. You are going to see shrinkage of any support for this system and that means that any town opts into this system is going to pay more. So let's hope that we can work out something that works better than having the county come in on this, at this expense. The other question he has and he has started to look into it and he possibly would ask the town attorney to do further investigation of this and that is, they get dispatched about half of the calls ALS by the county dispatcher, they know there not true but they get called ALS even if they are BLS calls, His question is, what actual responsibility does the town have to provide ALS service for the people in Stony Creek. In other words BLS and whatever we can get by borrowing the facilities of the neighboring towns, that's the way they have been going for a few years now, but to spend a projected amount of money for ALS alone and still maintain their BLS ambulance in this regard does not make sense and he does not believe, and this is a quite involved legal question, that they don't have it available we respond BLS, they transport BLS, they try to get ALS on route, if we run through Warrensburg or Lake Luzerne they get it on route. The currant captain said call them anytime they will intercept with them for ALS. That is a more workable way then sending a huge bundle of money for a county system that is really going to bail out North Creek. That's his feelings on the matter. It's kind of like a consensus of certain supervisors, Bolton Landing Supervisor and what not. They aren't getting anywhere with this system. Councilwoman Ryan asked where they were going to stage them out of. Mr. LaGrasse stated one North and one South on the Northway. When it gets busy there going to be in Bolton Landing and Lake George. The other discussion they made is if you're going to hire people you're going to give them retirement and medical. Who do you think are going to apply for those jobs? People working with these other squads. You're going to create a vacuum. They discussed this, you create a vacuum. Are you ever going to fill the vacuum not likely? The other thing is this report it says the ALS squads when the call volume plummets could investigate go into this. What does that mean? That means in the winter when there's no calls the tendency would be drop ALS from those squads and use the county system, which you're paying for

anyways maybe. In other words it's an attempt to have the county take over the ALS function entirely. Because how could you run an ALS in the Summer and not have it all year round. The other question in the report itself it says it would charge by use, not base figure for the service potentially. It appeared the phrase could be per call. It could be extraneous if there not make many calls.

Supervisor Thomas stated no that was directed more at Queensbury and Glens Falls or towns that didn't participate. Mr. LaGrasse stated he is telling about the wording in the report itself, it was twice stated with the same wording, which said "pay for services rendered" whatever that means. Supervisor Thomas stated all the numbers he saw was based on population. Queensbury and Glens Falls isn't going to be part of this anyway. They don't want to pay for out ALS.

Mr. LaGrasse stated that right now Glens Falls could very well be part of it by supplying their twenty two paramedics. Councilman Nathan Thomas stated the trouble with Glens Falls is that they are on recall so their paramedics work for North Queensbury, Skenesborough, and North Warren. When they have a fire those agencies are no longer staffed because their contract requires them to be recalled for fire service. When the twenty two paramedics are fighting fire you have no coverage in the county again. The City of Glens Falls goes out of service if there is a structure fire so they rely on West Glens Falls, Bay Ridge and Empire to cover the City of Glens Falls for all EMS calls. Supervisor Thomas stated the city sees it as a source of revenue. Councilman Nathan Thomas stated for their poor profit ambulance because they are already paying the staff so the ambulance is just profit. Supervisor Thomas stated it pays for the fire department. Councilman John Thomas asked who oversees who gets the calls for mutual aid. They use to get a lot of calls for mutual aid and they don't anymore. His assumption would be they aren't going to call them because there is no financial gain for their agency whereas they would call Luzerne, Corinth, and an agency that is going to gain financially. He knows it doesn't have anything to do with health care but that seems to be the trend since they are the last one left. Councilman Nathan Thomas stated they don't call Stony Creek because they're not on the mutual aid policy, they are on the automatic mutual aid, so the county's thought is they would rather push the button for Warrensburg or Lake George.

Councilman John Thomas stated he heard them call West Glens Falls for the Town of Day, which is just over the hill and it's a BLS call, that makes absolutely no sense but that is the trend, has been for a while. Councilman Nathan Thomas stated just like it makes sense to drop a tone for Lake George to respond for a full arrest on Drexel Road in Thurman. Unless you're listening to the radio and you call the county willing to intercept and tell the county this is Stony Creek base there is an EMT in station can you dispatch a driver we can respond to this call, it's a dispatch system problem.

A motion was made by Councilman Nathan Thomas seconded by Councilwoman Ryan to adjourn the meeting at 8:36 PM. All in favor, motion carried.
